COURSE: CJC 111 INTRO TO CRIMINAL JUSTICE

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course introduces the components and processes of the criminal justice system. Topics include history, structure, functions, and philosophy of the criminal justice system and their relationship to life in our society. Upon completion, students should be able to define and describe the major system components and their interrelationships and evaluate career options. *This course has been approved for transfer under the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement as a pre-major and/or elective course requirement.*

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Describe the differences among Criminal Justice/ Criminology and Criminal Law/Criminal Procedure.
2. Describe the differences in the types of law.
3. Explain general theories of Crime Causation.
4. Explain where criminal laws come from and the process by which the acts become defined as criminal.
5. Define crime.
6. Identify common uses of statistics in modern criminal justice.
7. Identify the stages of the criminal justice processes and identify what occurs at each stage.
8. Describe the historical roots of modern policing, courts, and corrections in America.
9. Identify the differences of the local, state, and federal levels of the criminal justice system.
10. Describe the function of each component of the criminal justice system.
11. Define how arrest search and seizure applies to life in our society.

SYLLABUS INFORMATION:

The Student Learning Outcomes listed in this syllabus are those required actions that a student who successfully completes the course must be able to perform. The educational experience, however, is a two-way, interactive process involving both the student and the instructor. The student must play an active role in the learning process in order to be successful. Instructors will provide an Instructor's Syllabus at the first class meeting explaining how they measure each of the Student Learning Outcomes. A student who is unable to accomplish the outcomes will not receive a passing grade in the course.

GRADING SYSTEM:
