



COURSE: HOR 134 GREENHOUSE OPERATIONS

HOURS: Lecture: 2 Lab: 2 Shop/Clinical: 0 Credits: 3

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course covers the principles and procedures involved in the operation and maintenance of greenhouse facilities. Emphasis is placed on the operation of greenhouse systems, including the environmental control, record keeping, scheduling, and production practices. Upon completion, students should be able to demonstrate the ability to operate greenhouse systems and facilities to produce greenhouse crops.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Match at least six important changes to the greenhouse industry and when they occurred, upon presentation of a time line.
2. Identify, accurately, the greenhouse glazing associated with those figures, when given U factors and Photosynthetically Active Radiation values.
3. Construct possible heating, cooling, and ventilating combinations to correct the problem 75% of the time, when given hypothetical scenarios of problematic greenhouse environmental conditions.
4. Explain in detail how sanitation and water issues can effect pest and disease control in the greenhouse environment.
5. Formulate fertilizer parts per million rates within 5% of the correct answer, when given plant nutrition needs.
6. Illustrate the relationships of greenhouse growing media and water-soluble fertilizer.
7. Identify and name the pest with 75% accuracy, when shown samples or pictures of greenhouse insect pests.

The Student Learning Outcomes listed in this syllabus are those required actions that a student who successfully completes the course must be able to perform. The educational experience, however, is a two-way, interactive process involving both the student and the instructor. The student must play an active role in the learning process in order to be successful. Instructors will provide an Instructor's Syllabus at the first class meeting explaining how they measure each of the Student Learning Outcomes. A student who is unable to accomplish the outcomes will not receive a passing grade in the course.
