



COURSE: CIS 115 INTRO TO PROG & LOGIC

HOURS: Lecture: 2 Lab: 3 Shop/Clinical: 0 Credits: 3

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course introduces computer programming and problem solving in a programming environment, including an introduction to operating systems, text editor, and a language translator. Topics include language syntax, data types, program organization, problem-solving methods, algorithm design, and logic control structures. Upon completion, students should be able to manage files with operating system commands, use top-down algorithm design, and implement algorithmic solutions in a programming language. *This course has been approved for transfer under the CAA as a general education course in Mathematics (Quantitative).*

1. Write computer logic flowcharts with M.S. Visio.
2. Write computer logic pseudocode.
3. Write programs in Python which utilize the seven basic control structures in programming.
4. Demonstrate debugging techniques utilizing the IDLE Python IDE.
5. Write Python scripts.
6. List and explain concepts associated with open source software.
7. Analyze problems related to computer software design.
