COURSE: ANT 210 GENERAL ANTHROPOLOGY

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course introduces the physical, archaeological, linguistic, and ethnological fields of anthropology. Topics include human origins, genetic variations, archaeology, linguistics, primatology, and contemporary cultures. Upon completion, students should be able to demonstrate an understanding of the four major fields of anthropology. *This course has been approved for transfer under the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement as a general education course in Social/Behavioral Science.*

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Define and explain anthropology; clarify the function of anthropology within today's societies.
2. Define and describe four subfields of anthropology.
3. Discuss the theory of evolution and explain how this theory can be applied to hominids throughout time.
4. Discuss cultural relativity.
5. Discuss the fluidity between assumed dichotomies, such as self/other, ancient/modern, savage/civilized, and science/myth.
6. Discuss the theories of historical particularism, functionalism, structuralism, post modernism, unilinear evolution, gender, cultural ecology, and environmental determinism.
7. Explain how knowledge of anthropology can be applied to better

understand the world in its current state.

SYLLABUS INFORMATION:

The Student Learning Outcomes listed in this syllabus are those required actions that a student who successfully completes the course must be able to perform. The educational experience, however, is a two-way, interactive process involving both the student and the instructor. The student must play an active role in the learning process in order to be successful. Instructors will provide an Instructor's Syllabus at the first class meeting explaining how they measure each of the Student Learning Outcomes. A student who is unable to accomplish the outcomes will not receive a passing grade in the course.

The information in this BCC Syllabus may not be accurate beyond the current semester. Textbooks and other course materials are subject to change. Students should verify the textbooks at the first class meeting with their instructor prior to purchasing.

GRADING SYSTEM:

Brunswick Community College employs a system of letter grades and corresponding quality points per grade to evaluate a student's performance in meeting the stated goals and objectives for each course. The grading system is published in the BCC Catalog and Student Handbook.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:
